



Admissions

Admissions Overview


The quality of The University of Alabama (UA) students as measured by their ACT Composite entrance exam scores has shown an upward trend since the late-90s (see Figure A1). However, according to available data, the percentage of students in the top 10% of their high school class has been falling (see Figure A6).

Geographical location, not surprisingly, acts as an important role in where UA draws its students. The larger high schools in the Tuscaloosa and Birmingham areas provide a sizable percentage of UA's First-Time Entering Freshmen (see Figure A3). Transfer students follow a similar pattern, with nearby institutions providing many additional students (see Figure A5).

Freshmen admissions have exhibited a cyclical pattern over the past eight years and are at all-time highs (see Figure A2). Transfer admissions, however, have been more erratic but have shown a slight upward trend since the late-90s (see Figure A4). Over the past decade the number of Alabama residents attending UA has been increasing. Out-of-state student enrollment fell during the 1990s but has been rising for the past several years (see Figure A7).

Annualized Freshmen Admissions Data: 1995 through 2004






Annualized Undergraduate Transfer Admissions Data: 1997 through 2004








First-Time Freshmen in Upper 10% of Their High School Class: Fall 1998 through Fall 2004



Enrollment


Enrollment Overview

Total and undergraduate enrollments declined sharply in the early to mid-90s but have rebounded to historic highs as of the current year (see Figures B1 & B2). Graduate student enrollment has been more varied but has also shown an upward trend since the mid-90s (see Figure B3).

Black student enrollments have also risen substantially in the past decade but have shown slight declines in the past several years (see Figure B4). International student enrollments vary by class level. International undergraduate students have declined over the past eight years, while the number of international graduate students has risen sharply during the same time-frame (see Figure B5). The number of students enrolled in honors' programs has shown a dramatic increase since the mid-1990's (see Figure B7), while students studying abroad has varied widely during the last several years (see Figure B6).


The resulting credit hours generated by enrolled students have risen for undergraduate and graduate students for the past several years and are at historic levels (see Figure B8).

Grand Total Enrollment: Fall 1994 through Fall 2004











Students Studying Abroad: 1996-97 through 2003-04






Students Enrolled in Honors Programs: Fall 1995 through Fall 2004

Retention and Graduation


Retention and Graduation Overview

The University of Alabama's freshmen retention rate has varied little over the past decade, fluctuating between 81-84%. UA's six-year graduation rate has shown an upward trend since the early 90's. Both rates, however, lag behind the Southern University Group (SUG) averages (see Figures C1 & C2).

The number of degrees conferred has fluctuated little during the mid to late-90s. The last few years, however, have shown a noticeable increase in bachelor degrees awarded while the number of all other degrees have remained fairly stable (see Figures C3a & C3b). When broken down by college, the number of degrees conferred by the colleges of Commerce and Business Administration, Communication and Information Sciences, and Human Environmental Sciences has increased dramatically during the past eight years. The number of degrees conferred by the colleges of Arts and Sciences, Engineering, Nursing, and Social Work has remained relatively stable during this time-frame, while the number for the college of Education has declined sharply (see Table C3).






Degrees Conferred (Bachelors, Masters, Doctorates): 1996-97 through 2003-04


Class Size

Class Size Overview

In terms of class size, the percentages of undergraduate and graduate classes with less than 20 students have fluctuated little since 1997. Similarly, the percentages of undergraduate and graduate classes with 50 or more students have remained relatively stable. The number of first-professional classes with less than 20 students has risen, while the percentage of classes with more than 50 students has decreased (see Figures D1 & D2).

Percent of Classes with Less than 20 Students: Fall 1997 through Fall 2004



Tuition

Tuition Overview

The charts given in this section compare The University of Alabama's (UA) tuition to those of Auburn University (AU) and the Southern University Group (SUG) average. In each case, undergraduate versus graduate and resident versus non-resident, UA's tuition is the lowest among the three.

UA's tuition increases over the past eight years outpaced the SUG average in all cases. UA's tuition increases exceeded AU's for non-residents (86.0% vs. 81.5%) but were less for resident students (78.5% vs. 85.0%).

Resident Undergraduate Tuition: 1997-98 through 2004-05





Non-Resident Undergraduate Tuition: 1997-98 through 2004-05


Resident Graduate Tuition: 1997-98 through 2004-05


Financial Aid

Financial Aid Overview

The amount of financial aid awarded to students has varied greatly over the years depending upon its type. State aid awards have dropped over the past decade to a total amount fluctuating around \$100,000. Aid from Pell Grants has risen dramatically since the mid-90s, increasing nearly 80% in the past five years. Fundings from Federal SEOG and Perkins Grants have roughly doubled in the past six years, while Stafford loan funding has remained fairly constant. Scholarship funding jumped substantially in 2002-03 from the previous year. Overall, for several years, the total dollars for financial aid remained relatively stable, but in 2002-03 the total increased sharply. Both the number of applicants and awards have increased during the time period shown. See Table F1.

Assessment

Assessment Overview

The National Survey of Student Engagement (NSSE) was designed to obtain information from scores of colleges and universities nationwide about student participation in programs and activities that institutions provide for their learning and personal development. The results provide an estimate of how undergraduates spend their time, indicate what undergraduates gain from attending college, and assess the overall quality of their undergraduate experience.

Research indicates that good educational practices in the classroom and interactions with others, such as faculty and peers, are directly related to high-quality student outcomes. The NSSE focuses on these practices by assessing student engagement in five key areas, called Effective Practice Scales.

Alabama participated in the NSSE for the first time in 2002 and again in 2004. The information provided in Table G1 compares UA's Effective Practice Scale scores in 2004 for freshmen and senior students to those of institutions in its Carnegie Classification and to all participating four-year institutions. It shows that UA scored very high within its Carnegie Classification in all but one of the scales for seniors and in two of the five scales for freshmen. Nationally, however, UA scored at the midpoint or below in all of the five scales for both seniors and freshmen.

Faculty/Staff Information Overview

On average, the number of executive, administrative, and managerial personnel in academic and non-academic divisions has gradually decreased over the past eight years. The number of black personnel, however, has increased during this interval. See Table H1.

The numbers of black faculty, as well as minority faculty, in general, and female faculty, have risen noticeably over recent years (see Figures H3 & H4 and Table H6). The percent of tenured female faculty has trended upward over the past eight years, while the percentage of female tenure-track faculty has fluctuated (see Figure H6). The percent of tenured faculty teaching lower division courses has declined in recent years (see Figure H7).

Average faculty salaries at UA have been consistently below the SUG and national averages at all levels throughout the past decade (see Figures H9a, H9b, H9c and Table H9).



Full-Time Black Faculty (EE02) and Administrative Staff (EE01): Fall 1997 through Fall 2004










Faculty Salaries (Professor) Compared to Regional and National Averages: 1996-97 through 2004-05

Faculty Salaries (Assistant Professor) Compared to Regional and National Averages: 1996-97 through 2004-05






Financial Information Overview

Sponsored program awards and gifts received have fluctuated greatly in the past six years (see Figures I1 & I2). The market value of endowment funds rebounded in 2002-03 after dropping nearly 25% in the two previous years (see Figure I3). Total operating revenues and expenses both slightly increased from 2002, while net non-operating revenues and net assets jumped dramatically (see Tables I4 & I5). The distribution of revenue from sources to the University has not changed appreciably over the past decade, although there has been a substantial reduction in the percentage provided by the State. See Table I6.


Sponsored Program Awards: 1996-97 through 2003-04

Percent Distribution of Total Expenses By Object: For Year Ended September 30, 2003




Performance Measures Overview

Three areas or bases were selected to show how the University performs as compared with other institutions: the U.S. News and World Report rankings, which are published annually; instructional productivity by discipline, based on a national study in which the University participates; and costs ratios, based on the same national study.

Overall, the University has improved its position in the U.S. News and World Report ranking. However, improvements are not seen in all of the scoring components (see Figures J1a through J1g). The greatest improvements have taken place with the components of peer assessment, graduation and retention, and alumni giving. Areas in which UA has lost positional reference with other national universities are financial resources, graduation performance, faculty resources, and student selectivity.

When measures of instructional productivity (Table J2) and cost ratios (Table J3) are examined as compared with peer institutions, the University performance varies based on the academic disciplines in the national study. Generally, though, the University compares favorably with the averages of the peer groups studied. A few disciplines at the University compare very favorably, while a few appear to compare less favorably.

US News and World Report Component Position for Peer Assessment: 1997-98 through 2003-04



US News and World Report Component Position for Graduation and Retention: 1997-98 through 2003-04



US News and World Report Component Position for Financial Resources: 1997-98 through 2003-04





US News and World Report Component Position for Faculty Resources: 1997-98 through 2003-04





US News and World Report Component Position for Student Selectivity: 1997-98 through 2003-04


